Back to the stage

Starting June 11 and running through June 27, a mainstage production returns to Hatbox Theatre in Concord with a unique twist on classic characters.




Poe: Stories and Poems: A Graphic Novel Adaptation

By Gareth Hinds
(103 pages, graphic novel, 2017)

If this book had been around when I was in middle school, I most certainly would have had a copy of it on my nightstand. In this graphic novel adaptation, artist Gareth Hinds illustrates some of the most beloved Edgar Allan Poe stories (*The Masque of the Red Death*, *The Cask of Amontill-*

lado, *The Pit and the Pendulum*, *The Tell-Tale Heart*) and poems (“Annabel Lee,” “The Bells,” “The Raven”) alongside Poe’s original text, rendered in comic book-style lettering.

This format really brings Poe’s work to life for a younger or more visually-oriented audience. Readers are treated to gorgeous illustrations in ink, watercolor, pencil, and charcoal, amongst other artistic media. Due to subject matter, this title would be most appropriate for a teen



takes pains to imply, rather than illustrate overtly, some of the Poe’s more frightening plot points.

One thing I really love is that Hines includes educational details throughout this work, making it an excellent introduction to Edgar Allan Poe for young readers. For

instance, he puts together a “Poe Checklist” of recurring themes (such as confinement, creepy animals, premature burial) and points out which of these themes show up in every story and poem featured. The author’s note at the end of the book puts each poem and story, and Poe’s body of work as a whole, into historical context, and explains some of Hinds’ artistic decisions. For those who enjoy this style, CPL also has Hinds’ graphic novel adaptations of *Beowulf*, *The Iliad*, and *Romeo & Juliet* available for checkout.

As Hines describes in his

author’s note, “Poe is beloved in a way few authors can ever hope to be. His work buries itself in the psyche and, though it horrifies, it also thrills and delights.” Quite so! I won’t deny that this work is a bit dark — but as a lifetime lover of the macabre, I believe it will hit all the right notes for those fellow readers that enjoy a good shiver up the spine and never shy away from things that go “bump” in the night.

ister to vote prior to Election Day. For more information about the upcoming election, contact the City Clerk's Office at 225-8500 or via e-mail at cityclerk@concordnh.gov. The City Clerk's Office is open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., with extended hours until 6 p.m. on Thursdays.

Parking garage closure: The School Street Garage will be closed June 11, 12, & 13 for the reorganization of lease, permit, and metered parking spaces, prior to pressure washing.

Big Guns Pressure Washing will be pressure washing the City's parking garages during the following weekends in June – School Street: June 11, 12, and 13, and State Street: June 25, 26, 27. Pressure washing will occur from Friday night to Monday morning. Each garage will be closed to the public overnight from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. on these days. Daytime parking will be permitted. All vehicles must vacate the premises by 7 p.m.

Storrs Street Garage: The State of NH has a contractor team working on rehabilitating the deck of the Storrs Street Legislative Parking Garage; this work will involve lane closures and

maintenance of one-way traffic underneath the garage at times, as well as intermittent parking space and sidewalk closures. Work is expected to continue into mid-June.

Washington Street Bridge: The Washington Street Bridge will be closed during the day while the contractor is actively working. This closure began on May 3. The closure can be expected between 7 a.m. – 7 p.m., but may be shorter each day based on the contractor's schedule.

At some point in the coming weeks, the bridge will be closed completely until mid- to late-August, and there will be a follow-up advanced notice with more details.

During the closure, traffic traveling southbound on Washington Street will be detoured down Millstream Lane to Borough Road. Traffic traveling northbound on River Road /Washington Street will be detoured down Borough Road to Millstream Lane. Below is a plan showing the detour route, which will be designated with signage along the route.



walls have been tiled, concrete decks have been poured, the interior of the bathrooms have been painted, and the plumbing and drain faceplates have been installed. Plastering for the pool has started as of Thursday and will continue through Saturday. The pebble finish for the beach entry has been completed and the concrete floor of the pool has been power washed. Plastering will be completed today and the pool filling will begin. The pool will be fully filled by Saturday and this will work to cure the plaster under water. Next week the ladders and pool accessories will be installed, and Public Properties staff will receive training for the new automated chemical controller. The last step will be completing a final inspection and clean-up. Construction

is anticipated for completion in a couple of weeks. Visit concordnh.gov/publicproperties for more information.

Long Line Road Striping: The City's contractor, K5 Corporation, continues to complete long line striping throughout the city. Work includes the painting of white fog and skip lines and double yellow lines. Striping will occur for recently paved roads, and restriping will be performed in other areas as needed to improve line visibility and increase driver safety. Work will be completed between the hours of 8 p.m. and 5 a.m. nightly, weather depending.

Drought conditions: As of June 3, drought conditions improved slightly for South-eastern parts of New Hampshire. Currently, 10.41% of the state is not experiencing any drought conditions, 82.37% is experiencing ab-

normally dry conditions (including Concord), and 7.22% is categorized in a moderate drought. Rain from this past weekend helped improve conditions slightly by 1.55%.

More precipitation is still very much needed. The precipitation deficit for Concord has decreased about an inch since last week from the rain, but it is still 4.08 inches below average for this time of year. The National Weather Service predicts a 33-40% probability of below average precipitation for the region in the next 8-14 days. A lot more rain is needed to help make a difference in drought conditions.

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) is recommending for outdoor water use restrictions to be implemented for community water systems and mu-

nicipalities across NH. At this time, Concord is not implementing watering restrictions as our water supply remains healthy. It is possible restrictions may be implemented if drought conditions continue to worsen and if water consumption gets too high.

Water consumption was much higher than average last summer and consumption continues to trend high again this year. Concord's Water Treatment Facility has been producing 5.8MGD – 6.0MGD (millions of gallons per day) of water for the past couple of weeks. This is above average for this time of year, which is typically closer to 5.0MGD. Increased water use is linked with the return of irrigation and outdoor water use, with higher than average volumes due to dry conditions driven by the drought.

We advise everyone to please conserve water use as a proactive measure to manage our water source. Be mindful of your water use, especially outdoors. Simple conservation practices include minimizing irrigation and lawn watering, and inspecting systems for water leaks. Practice watering at night or early morning to minimize evaporation and consider using weather-based irrigation controllers to avoid unnecessary watering if it rains.

Drought conditions will continue to be monitored. Please continue to use water wisely. We thank everyone for their efforts to conserve water. Every drop counts! Find drought updates and water conservation tips at www.concordnh.gov/conservation.

history

June 10, 1983: A celebration marks the opening of Eagle Square. Former mayor Martin Gross delivers a poem to mark the occasion. One stanza describes the Eagle Stable, which will soon be open in the Crystal Courtyard, a mini-mall for specialty foods:

Your stable's stalls, once equine halls, soon hungry souls will seek.

No hay or mash but gourmet stash - an appetite boutique.

June 10, 1900: A Concord police officer arrests clerk Walter Davis at Fitch's Drug Store for selling soda water on Sunday. The law allows for Sunday sales of only "bread, milk and the other necessities of life." A judge will let Davis off, saying that soda is as necessary to life as milk and that citizens should be encouraged to drink anything other than alcoholic beverages.

June 10, 1813: New Hampshire Congressman Daniel Webster introduces a set of resolutions challenging the reasons the United States entered war with Great Britain the pre-

vious year. It is the beginning of a rapid rise to Federalist leadership for the freshman member of Congress.

June 11, 2001: People passing by the federal courthouse in Concord share their reactions to the early morning execution of Timothy McVeigh. Their overwhelming sentiment: Good riddance.

June 11, 1971: Attorney General Warren Rudman advises Gov. Walter Peterson not to worry about reports that a large group of hippies will flood northern New Hampshire and Vermont this summer. Peterson named a committee to investigate reports that land was being bought in northern New Hampshire for the use of a large number of youths who planned to move in and begin such things as organic farming.

June 11, 1776: Dr. Josiah Bartlett and William Whipple, representing New Hampshire in the Continental Congress in Philadelphia, write to the colony's president, Meshech Weare, that a committee has been

appointed to draft a declaration of independence. "As this is a Subject of the greatest importance," they write, "we beg we may be furnish'd with the Sentiments of our Constituents as we wish to Act agreeable to them let our own be what they may."

June 11, 1875: The widow of John A. Winslow, captain of the USS Kearsarge of Civil War fame, climbs Mount Kearsarge to select a granite boulder to adorn her husband's grave. The people of Warner help her move the stone to the railroad station for the trip to a Boston cemetery.

June 11, 1837: Samuel Coffin Eastman is born in Concord. A great-grandson of Ebenezer Eastman, Concord's first settler, he will become a prominent lawyer, bank president, railroad man, speaker of the New Hampshire House and school board member. In 1915, when Concord celebrates the 150th anniversary of its royal charter as a parish, he will be recognized as the city's most prominent citizen and "president of the day."

June 12, 2001: About 40 educators, health care workers, environmentalists and others march from Alenstown to Concord to mark the 10th anniversary of the Claremont school funding lawsuit.

June 12, 1886: The Daniel Webster statue is dedicated in front of the State House.

June 12, 1905: J.N. Marston of Dublin is the first motorist in New Hampshire to receive a speeding ticket. Shortly after the first statutes governing motor vehicle conduct are enacted, Marston is collared for "driving his machine about the streets of Keene in a somewhat reckless manner." He is caught after overtaking and overturning a horse-drawn buggy, injuring the two occupants. The police cite him for exceeding 8 mph.

June 12, 1892: Eva Brunel is born in Worcester, Mass. She will have a career as an athletic director, but her claim to fame will be as owner and operator of Chinoek Kennels in the village of Wonalancet. She and her husband, Milton John Seeley, will buy the kennels in 1930, and she will run them for many years after his death in 1943. The kennels will train northern sledge dogs for Rear Admiral Richard Byrd's first and second Antarctic expeditions and for cold-weather military service during World War II. At the 1932 Winter Olympics at Lake Placid, Eva Seeley will be the only female sledge-dog driver.

June 12, 1977: In Concord, William Loeb tells the Gun Owners of New Hampshire that the only way to combat "anti-gun nuts" is "to go directly to the great mass of American people and educate them on the obvious necessity of citizens owning and having guns."

June 12, 1804: Alarmed by the frequency of escapes from local prisons, Gov. John Gilman makes the first substantive proposal for a state prison in Concord. It will be more than eight years before the prison opens on North State and Tremont streets.

June 12, 1842: Snow squalls are reported in Bristol.

June 12, 1800: The federal government buys its first naval yard, an island in the Piscataqua River off Portsmouth. It pays a private citizen, William Dennett Jr., \$5,500 for the land. The bill of sale is filed in York County, Maine. The deed is filed in Rockingham County, N.H.


June 13, 1859: A huge fire on the southwest corner of Main and Pleasant streets in Concord consumes a bakery, several stores and the South Congregational Church. When it becomes certain that the fire will destroy the granite-and-wood Greek Revival church, the Rev. Henry Parker gives one final pull to the church bell rope, and the bell is heard above the crackle of flames.

June 13, 1920: James Cleveland is born. He will serve as Second District congressman from 1963 to 1981 after practicing law in Concord and New London and serving 12 years in the state Senate.

June 13, 1954: This is Freedom Day in New Hampshire, so declared by Gov. Hugh Gregg as a day of remembrance and prayer for those who have died resisting the Communist regime in Eastern Europe.

June 13, 1767: With pomp and circumstance, John Wentworth assumes the office of royal governor in Portsmouth. As such, he will

lead an agrarian and mercantile colony of 98 towns totaling 52,000 people. The population of Concord, characterized by one historian as "an outpost of radical republicanism," is 752.

June 13, 1775: Exactly eight years after assuming the royal governorship of New Hampshire, John Wentworth moves with his family into Fort William and Mary in Portsmouth Harbor, under the protection of a British warship. He has been relatively benevolent in his reaction to the growing revolt against British rule of the colonies, and he is not bitter about his fate. From the fort he will write a friend: "Truely I can say with the poet in his Lear 'I am a man much more sinned against than sinning.'"

June 13, 1983: A 92-year-old covered truss bridge, fondly called Old Red by residents of Pembroke, collapses in a fierce storm. "It was bypassed by a modern bridge and wasn't in use," says Jim Garvin of the New Hampshire Historical Society. "But it was of interest to a few local people. It's been sitting there like kind of a relic."

June 14, 1776: New Hampshire's General Court adopts a resolution asserting "that our Delegates at the Continental Congress . . . are hereby instructed to join with the other Colonies in Declaring the thirteen united colonies, a free & in-

dependent state." Four days later, Meshech Weare, the colony's president, will forward the resolution to Josiah Bartlett and William Whipple in Philadelphia.

June 14, 1831: Benjamin Brown French, a rising politico from Chester, goes to a party in Concord with future U.S. senator Charles G. Atherton and future president Franklin Pierce. His companions, both in their 20s, are "smashed" by a pair of bright eyes, & a beautiful face," but French "would as soon think of falling in love with an elegant piece of statuary." He tells his diary: "Give me eyes that can pierce the very soul, & a countenance that bespeaks a mind within."

June 14, 1944: Speaking on the causes of juvenile delinquency, Dr. Anna Philbrook, a psychiatrist at the State Hospital, says: "Children are growing up in homes where they have no facilities for play, where parents are so deeply concerned with earning enough money to buy the food needed by the family that they cannot spare the time to guide their children to healthful recreation."

June 14, 1962: Astronaut Alan Shepard of Derry is in Concord for the unveiling of his portrait at the State House. After a week of speeches and banquets, he says, he is glad the picture shows him in a space suit so people will know that "at least once in a while I do work."





