
'Mr. Campion's Memory'

By Mike Ripley (228 pages, mystery, 2023) London 1972, Mr. Campion's nephew, Christopher, a public relations man, asks for Campion's help at Christopher's father's funeral. He needs to have Campion search his memory from and try to remember events 40 years ago.

This event is somehow connected to the modern-day murder of the reporter. (Lugg is one of my favorite characters in the series. He's a combination of a butler, cook, and assistant and looks like bouncer. He has his own way of speaking and way of looking at the world).

What Campion does find in his unofficial investigation are unsavory characters, racism, gypsy camps, an impoverished gentlewoman, dubious stories, forgery, a fanatical horsewoman, and a long-lost son. At the end there's a terrifying chase through the woods at night! Campion is being pursued by a relentless killer. Finally, someone is killed in a very unusual way, one that I've never come across before. It's unexpected and unique!

Author Mike Ripley does an admirable job of continuing with Margery

Allingham's Campion tales. Margery is one of the four "Queens of Crime" - the others are Agatha Christie, Dorothy Sayers and Ngaio Marsh. If you like this mystery, you are in luck. There are others in the series, and you should also try the original Campion stories by Allingham. They are wonderful, and Campion and Lugg are quite an interesting and formidable team!

Discover unique and vintage finds downtown

'Once you start secondhand shopping, you realize your personal style develops really quickly'

ooking to find a unique and appreciated gift or some holiday decor, but worried about adding to the waste stream? Shopping at consignment or thrift stores is a fuss-free way to take one step toward making a sustainable choice.

"At a consignment store, you are shopping sustainably without even trying because it's just built into the business model," said Elyssa Alferi, the owner of Lilise Designer Resale, a vintage and designer consignment store on Main Street.

Purchasing previously owned items keeps products in circulation for longer while also reviving old fashion trends like oversize jackets and vintage sequined bags from the 1990s.

At Lilise, Alferi gives a home to designer labels like Chanel, Gucci, Tory Burch and others that still have a lot of life left in them. Concord residents can shop for high-end fashion items without having to travel all the way down to big cities like Boston or New York City, thanks to the store's consignment of curated designer labels.

Unlike fast fashion fabrics such as acrylic or plastic leather, most of the clothes in the store are made from sustainable fabrics such as wool and cotton, which compost better but are more expensive to buy off the rack.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency, landfills in the United States were a dumping ground for 11.3 million tons of textile waste in 2018, accounting for more than 65% of all

textiles produced that year.

Apart from sustainability, thrift shopping can help you find your authentic style by experimenting with different styles of clothing rather than going to a store that projects their style on you, said Alferi, a lifelong thrifter

"Once you start secondhand shopping, you realize your personal style develops really quickly versus a sense of style and I think that's important," explained Alferi.

Secondhand shopping extends far beyond clothing. Whether you're looking for a vintage couch, a quirky decor piece, or a rare book, consignment stores are a treasure trove of one-of-a-kind finds that can't be found anywhere else.

In fact, a vintage piece of furniture would better withstand the test of time, said Sue McCoo, one of the owners of Hilltop Consignment Store on Main Street. The store offers pre-owned furniture, books, clothes, vinyl records, and more, featured across two floors.

"Many of the older things

were better made, and particularly furniture," said McCoo. "Some of it is 50 or 100 years old, and it'll go another 50 or 100 years."

Thrift shopping is not only a cost-effective and environmentally friendly way to shop, but it is also gaining popularity among younger generations. The sheer joy of discovering a special item and the nostalgia associated with each item are just a few of the reasons why secondhand shopping has gained so much appeal in recent times

"There is an incredible history behind mundane stuff that you would never think have any value," said Brad Decker, owner of Concord Antiques, pointing to 20th-century dinnerware brought in by one of his dealers from an old house the owners were selling. "Everything here has a piece of history."

McCoo describes consignment stores as "living museums."

At Decker's store, most of the items are sourced from auctions, yard sales and people wanting to declutter their homes. He says that while it is unfortunate that sometimes people don't see the value of items that are still in good condition, offering them at the store gives those items a second chance to find a new home where they will be appreciated and used.

These local consignment stores not only provide unique finds for customers, but they also have a positive impact on the community. By practicing profit-sharing with consignors, who are often residents of the Concord area, a portion of the money from sales goes back into the local economy.

"People don't always want or should necessarily donate their stuff, so this is a way for people to get some money," McCoo explained. "So it [the consignment store] does a lot of things, and all of the money stays local, so it's a circular economy."

Taking the time to find a

new home for items before throwing them away, explained McCoo can be a great way to reduce waste and promote sustainability.

Before you throw something away, ask if your neighbors want it or if there is someone who is crafty and looking for a specific item to turn into something new. If not, consider donating them to a charity or bringing them to a consignment store.

It's a small but important step that can make a big difference in the long run.

"I think it's important to keep as much stuff out of landfills as possible and just give it another life," Alferi said. "If you dump those materials [that take a long time to decompose] in a landfill, your kids or their kids will be stepping on them years later."

Nov. 30, 2003: Speaking at a house party in Bow, presidential candidate Howard Dean says that an independent Palestinian state is the best hope for an Arabspeaking democracy in the Middle East. And only an American president can broker the Israeli-Palestinian peace accord needed to establish such a state, he savs.

Nov. 30, 2001: Robert Tulloch, a teenager accused of killing two Dartmouth College professors will use an insanity defense at his trial, his lawyer states in a court filing. The defendant will argue he suffers from a "severe mental defect or disease and that his acts were the direct result of the mental defect of disease," public defender Richard Guerriero states in the filing.

Nov. 30, 1870: Fire burns out the stone warehouse behind the Eagle Hotel, leaving only the granite walls standing. Today, the warehouse is home to the Museum of New Hampshire History.

Dec. 1, 2001: With a weekend of spontaneous and rehearsed music, the Concord Community Music School celebrates a milestone: the grand opening of a \$1.5 million addition that more than doubles the space for the school.

Dec. 1, 1848: Edward E. Sturtevant, a Concord printer, writes to his parents in Keene: "The Shakers are having a trial before a Legislative committee, which excites some curiosity among the people of this town... A petition is presented for a law against parents and guardians binding children to them, alleging that they (the children) are taught to disregard all friendship for father & mother & brothers & sisters - to know no God except the Elders of the Shaker Society - and accusing the Shakers of abusing them & killing them, &c.&c. The peti-₹ tioners have brought for-

ward some 20 who have been Shakers but left them who testify strongly in favor of the petitioners. It is amusing to hear these backsliders swear down the religion of Anna Lee."

Dec. 1, 1994: The early morning barks of a dog save the lives of six residents in a Merrimack Street apartment house destroyed by fire. The cause: overheated wiring within a bathroom wall.

Dec. 2, 2000: Shortly before 2 p.m. Canterbury Country Store owner Bob Summers rings up his final sale and then shuts the place down. The store will reopen nearly a year later, after members of the community invest several hundred thousand dollars to buy it.

Dec. 2, 1774: New Hampshire's committee of correspondence, formed the previous year to stay in touch with other colonies about acts of the British Parliament, sends a warrant to all towns urging the adoption of a continental association. The association's purpose is to establish a boycott on the import and consumption of British goods. Although Portsmouth and Exeter will quickly approve the warrant, itinerant merchants working further inland will make the boycott difficult to enforce.

Dec. 2, 1962: Deposits of thorium are discovered in the White Mountains.

Dec. 3, 2001: Manchester inventor Dean Kamen unveils the Segway Human Transporter on ABC's Good Morning America. Formerly known as Ginger or IT, the one-person, battery-powered scooter averages a speed of 8 mph, but can travel up to 17 or 18 mph.

Dec. 3, 1963: Gov. John King says he favors an appropriate memorial for the slain President John F. Kennedy but will oppose any effort to rename one of New Hampshire's mountains after Kennedy.

Dec. 3, 1991: John Sununu, who left New Hampshire's corner office three

years earlier to become President Bush's most powerful adviser on domestic politics, resigns as White House chief of staff. Sununu writes that he did not want to become a "political negative" for the president and a "drag" on his reelection chances.

Dec. 4, 1900: In raids, 16 police officers from Manchester and Suncook bust 20 people under the state's pro-

hibition statute. Since bootleggers are still active, "there will be plenty to drink," a Suncook villager says.

Dec. 5, 1908: Fire Chief William Green sets out for the movies at Phenix Hall, but even though the same show played at the nearby Opera House for more than a year, the Phenix is filled. There are plans to convert yet another building in the Durgin block into a theater.

Dec. 5, 1999: A fire breaks out at South Congregational Church in Concord 45 minutes before a scheduled performance of Handel's Messiah. After about 80 singers and musicians in formal attire gather on Pleasant Street, they head for nearby St. Paul's Church, where about 200 people are treated to an impromptu rendition of the oratorio's most famous section.





